Central Station rekindles chief's interest in job

Veteran Fire Chief Joseph E. McDonough apparently has doused a flickering notion to retire and indulge a long-held fantasy of opening an ice cream stand.

McDonough, a veteran of 27 years with the fire department, says the newly completed renovations of the former Central Fire Station have given him a fresh outlook on his job.

"This is a new lease on life here," McDonough said excitedly of the \$100,000 facelift at Central Station, which was shut down eight years ago after city officials decided it was too expensive to heat 24 hours a day when oil prices were high.

But city officials decided last year to reopen the station and make it once again the city's firefighting headquarters, which has been located in the Public Safety Building.

"I love it here," McDonough said of his department's new digs. "I'm happier now than I have been in a long time. I feel so comfortable here. It feels so much like home." For a few years, whenever rumors of McDonough's possible retirement have surfaced, he has said he would remain chief as long as he had tuition-paying kids in school.

Retirement would mean a pension at half his salary, but it would also allow him to pursue what he has half-seriously said would be the fulfillment of a dream — running an ice cream stand.

But for a couple years anyway, McDonough said, he's here to stay and watch over what may be to him the most fulfilling achievement of his days as chief: Getting Central reopened.

It will house not only his office and those of the deputy chiefs, but the Fire Prevention Bureau, which has been in City Hall.

A Medcu ambulance, pumper and ladder truck will also be housed there.

Though city coucilors last year decided to spend \$25,000 to \$50,000 fixing up Central, the costs are nearer \$100,000, City Manager Robert B. Ganley said.

"It's definitely more than we budgeted," Ganley said. "We'll have to eat it in the fire

department budget or somewhere in the overall budget."

The cost, Ganley and McDonough said, would have been perhaps \$200,000 had firefighters not done much the work — tearing down partitions, installing flooring and electrical receptacles.

"We've done miraculous things here," McDonough said. "The firefighters have done 90 percent of the work.

"If we spent \$90,000, if it were not for the firefighters, we would have spent at least double that," the chief added. "I feel as though if the 60,000 taxpayers had the opportunity to walk through the building, they'd be amazed at the work the firefighters have done," their boss said. "It's a tremendous buy. I couldn't be more pleased. I'm awestruck, what can I tell you?"

As for repaving the front and exterior parking lots at Central, "It had to be paved," the chief said. "I've been in the fire department 27 years and it hasn't been paved."

The station is about a week away from its official opening, which had been set for Nov. 1.
